We continue to see the numbers of Spanish Mustangs decline as big breeders and ranchers can no longer keep large herds. Small breeders are having a hard time selling horses in today's horse market. We fear the loss of important bloodlines. The characteristics of this small horse have evolved through survival. Their intelligence, stamina, strong bones, quickness and soundness give them the qualities of good trail horses, endurance horses, and ranch horses. The Foundation is working to preserve them for the future. We have fed 200 horses this year. We are working to bring people and horses together for first hand experience in training and riding. We are starting a new program to help horse owners who are experiencing challenges caring for their horses. Please let us know if we can help your horse through a difficult winter or if you need medical assistance with gelding or other medical problems. I am grateful for the opportunity to work with The Spanish Mustang Foundation. I have worked with at-risk youth for more than ten years, have always been interested in learning horsemanship, and in the last few years have begun to combine the two. As a therapist co-facilitating equine-assisted therapy, I learned the calming effect these large animals have on the therapeutic process and the insight they can bring. In equine-assisted therapy, clients attempt to move horses through planned obstacle courses while a horse person watches for safety and a therapist observes how the human and horse interact. Lessons come from resistance. How does it feel to the client when the horse won't move? How does it feel to achieve what was intended? Some ways of communicating are more effective than others and the horses give immediate feedback in their behavior. Horses also require our acute awareness and focused attention for safety. They force you to be in the present moment, a valuable therapeutic tool. The Spanish Mustang Foundation affords me the opportunity to learn "natural horsemanship". I am learning equine behavior and herd dynamics through groundwork training exercises and riding along to feed, water and move horses. I get to experience perhaps what my clients experience in the way of resistance, frustration, accomplishment and connection.

Montego is the love of my horse life, not because of the issues that he has overcome, but because of his willingness to overcome them. He has spent the last several years moving past human-inflicted trauma, and he will probably struggle with people forever. But despite his struggles he is letting me ride on his back. He is the stronger being between us - emotionally and physically - and he did what many of us cannot: he changed his mind about people. Somewhere along the line, he realized that he was wrong in his belief that all humans are dangerous, and because of his willingness to change his belief, I was able to enter his life.

He inspires me to live truthfully and in the moment. He reminds me that people (and animals) can change, and to have faith that they will, given space, time, and gentle guidance. He has taught me to take a patient, yet firm hand in all areas of my life, and to not worry about what horrors tomorrow might bring; to live in the moment. When we are standing together in the corral, safe and comfortable and grateful, life really is just as simple as the sun on your face, the New Mexico sky wide and blue, and the smell of horse as your fingers run absently through thick winter hair.
